






What is Integration?

Employment as part of the Integration System




Employment instead of the Integration System



Limited Implementation of the Ordinance on Integration Agreement (2017) due to:

- Lack of coordination
- Lack of funding
- Lack of interest on the part of municipalities

Employment and Refugees: Opportunities



- Liberal Legal Framework: short timeframe for access to the job market and no special permits required
- General lack of labour force in Bulgaria
- Motivation of refugees
- Excellent cooperation among various stakeholders
- Readiness on the part of refugees to work in traditional sectors of Bulgarian economy
- More and more socially responsible enterprises

Some achievements by NGOs since 2017

OVER 200 REFUGEES Assisted in job placement annually

OVER 70 COMPANIES FROM MORE THAN 15 SECTORS Are actively involved in job matching and coaching services

6 JOB FAIRS

4 in Sofia and 2 in Harmanli **350 REFUGEES** Have participated **30% OF THEM** Have been hired


1800 REFUGEES trained in Bulgarian language in the last five years

<image/> <text></text>	1	Processing industry	Mainly textile industry, food and beverage production, mechatronics and electrical components
	2	Agriculture	Mainly in North-Eastern and North-Western regions of Bulgaria
	3	Construction	Positions requiring lower level of technical expertise
	4	Accommodation & food services	Requiring also a variety of language skills
	5	BPO/outsourcing sector	Making use of the specific and rare language skills of the refugees
	6	Human health and social services	Lower qualified positions in hospitals
	7	Real estate services	Mainly in the property and facility management
	8	Transportation and storage	Positions such as drivers, warehouse workers





Mismatch: refugee skills vs. refugee needs






Challenges

- Contact between asylum-seekers and employers
- Engaging women in employment
- Access to bank accounts and financial services
- Limited recognition of education and previous skills
- Lack of job opportunities in smaller towns
- Limited role of the Labour Bureaux
- Cultural differences

- 13 are employed, 22 search for jobs
- 6 have labour contracts
- 1 has his own company
- 2 are women

Latest Developments

- Sharing of job vacancies with the State Agency for Refugees on a weekly basis
- Bulgarian language courses by the Employment Agency
- Enhanced entrepreneurship trainings
- Access to microfunding for start-ups
- Diversity Charter
- Advocacy for Legal Amendments with regard to access to bank accounts
